

Code Enforcement - The Art of Gaining Compliance

Based upon: The Art of Code Enforcement, by Martin Collins

Code Enforcement is like an artist putting paint to canvas. As there are many colors, styles and genres of painting. Code enforcement entails administering and managing many standards, functions, demands and priorities, and the processes can be very messy, but when done right is very effective and provides value to the community. No two communities are alike, as are no two paintings. Through topical and open discussion, case study problem solving activities participants will learn practical ways to improve their effectiveness as managers, inspectors and administrative staff to enhance the beauty within their communities.

Principles and Application of Zoning for the Code Enforcement Officer

Understanding the principles and application of the International Zoning Code and zoning in your jurisdiction is essential in gaining compliance with land use violations.

Objectives: Importance of zoning enforcement to the public health and safety in our communities; Understanding of the principals, definitions and common zoning violations that maybe encountered during the course of our duties; Identify and demonstrate the major components in local zoning ordinances and their application and enforcement; Understand the International Zoning Code; Primer for the IZC Certification exam.

Essential Principles and Skills for the Effective Code Enforcement Officer

Understanding key concepts and skills necessary to perform the duties of a code enforcement officer will benefit new and experienced inspectors alike.

Objectives: An introduction to key legal principles and concept of code enforcement; Power, duties and authority of a code enforcement officer; Understanding of the importance of effective communication skills; Customer Service; How does the IPMC, IRC and local ordinance work together.

Mass Timber and Type IV Construction in the 2021 IBC

The 2021 International Building Code (IBC) allows for construction of tall mass timber buildings with larger heights and areas than previously permitted in Types III, IV, and V construction. This course will provide an overview of mass timber which includes any product currently permitted for use in Type IV (heavy timber) construction such as cross-laminated timber (CLT), structural composite lumber (SCL), glued laminated timber (glulam), mechanically laminated decking (aka nail-laminated timber, NLT), and large section sawn timbers. Learn about provisions first introduced in the 2015 and 2018 IBC for mass timber construction as well as an overview of tall mass timber construction per the 2021 IBC and 2021 International Fire Code. Research and development conducted in support of new tall mass timber Construction Types IV-A, IV-B and IV-C in the 2021 IBC will also be discussed. Topics include: heights and areas, fire safety, fire and connection design, construction fire safety, special inspection, energy, acoustics and lateral design provisions.



Residential Wood Construction FAQs

Professionals working with residential structures often wind up asking the same questions frequently. We've collected some of the best questions we've been asked over the years and have compiled them into a program that touches on relevant FAQs, best practices, and other helpful pointers that will benefit code officials and designers and the construction community. The topics range from common connection issues, FAQs on solid sawn and engineered wood products, residential deck design questions, common design pitfalls and other information that doesn't quite fit in anywhere else.

Codes That Safeguard Buildings Under Construction

This program provides information to assist the Fire Service charged with responsibilities for fire and life safety on a construction site to follow best practices. Builders and building officials will also benefit from the information provided. The purpose is to reduce the risk of injuries and losses from fire. The information applies to the design and planning stages as well as the actual construction phase of buildings. Many hazards can be addressed before they become an issue by adoption of best practices and rigorous code enforcement. The primary focus of this program is on large buildings during construction. Other topics that include demolition, alterations, renovations, repair and maintenance, as well as newly-completed buildings will be discussed. This program provides guidance that is based on compliance with Chapter 33 of the 2021 International Fire Code, Chapter 33 of the 2021 International Building Code, and NFPA Standards 1 and 241.

2021 ISPSC Design, Installation and Inspection Principles

This seminar will introduce you to the 2021 International Swimming Pool and Spa Code (ISPSC). The seminar is designed to address the needs of code officials, contractors, installers, architects and pool builders. The seminar includes information regarding energy, barriers, suction entrapment and circulation systems and much more. We will also discuss the benefits of adopting this all-encompassing code and what it means for enforcement agencies.
